Visionary Award & Sight Loss Friendly York

We are delighted to share that MySight York has won the Accelerating Impact Award at the Visionary UK Awards 2025, sponsored by Fight for Sight.

Voted for by sight loss organisations across the country, this national award celebrates projects that create meaningful and lasting change. It recognises the impact of Community Connect, our peer-led initiative that is helping to make York a truly Sight Loss Friendly City, one organisation at a time.

Through Community Connect, people with sight loss work directly with local organisations to make practical improvements to accessibility and inclusion. Over the past three years, hundreds of members have helped shape change across York, from inclusive sports and sensory storytelling to digital skills sessions and accessible heritage events.

More than 40 community-focused organisations and businesses are working with us to achieve Sight Loss Friendly Status. This status is more than a certificate; it is a clear message that says, you are welcome here.

Recently, we were proud to present Sight Loss Friendly awards to two outstanding York organisations.

The National Centre for Early Music (NCEM) achieved their certificate during their first Cuppa and a Chorus singing session. Dr Christopher Roberts, Operations Manager at NCEM, said:

“One of our core values is being welcoming to all. We are always looking to engage with new audiences, so it was fantastic to celebrate our Sight Loss Friendly Status with MySight York.”

Earlier this autumn, Holy Trinity Church, Goodramgate, part of The Churches Conservation Trust, also achieved the status. Their thoughtful accessibility improvements, from low-vision markings in dark spaces to creative Sensory Tours, have set a new standard for inclusion.

Both organisations show what is possible when people listen, learn and act. By working alongside our team, they have transformed not only their spaces but their approach to inclusivity.

This is the heart of Community Connect: collaboration that leads to change. When people with lived experience help shape decisions, accessibility becomes integral rather than an afterthought. Together, we are building a more inclusive York.

This work has been proudly supported by the National Lottery Community Fund.

Welcome to Tanya McClelland, Volunteer Coordinator



Hello everyone!

I probably haven't had the pleasure of meeting of you yet – I'm Tanya, the new volunteer Coordinator!

It's been two months since I have started employment here at MySight York and I have to say that I'm really enjoying it. Everyone has been so welcoming and friendly. It's hard to believe that I have been here only a short while as I do feel really 'rooted' in already and that I'm taking that as a sure sign of good things to come.

The small but mighty staff team continue to impress me with their utter dedication and generosity in providing the vital services they manage for members.

They take the time to share useful tips to help me understand the complicated charity log system and provide useful background so that I have a better picture of a members needs and how our work can support individuals to live well with sight loss. You can tell that they really care about this community. I'm also really relishing working within our office in Walmgate. It's a very dynamic workspace and I've enjoyed the opportunity to chat to members and volunteers on their

way to activities and appointments. (I must apologise for all the milky teas and coffees I've produced lately – there is definitely room for improvement there!)

I'm finding being a volunteer coordinator a very dynamic, expansive and exciting role. I've been very busy on the ground recruiting new volunteers, conducting interviews, catching up on supervisions, doing a bit of troubleshooting here and there and helping existing volunteers branch out into other roles.

New in the E & I

As we come to the end of the year we are pleased to announce that 2026 diaries and calendars are now in stock.

The products have good quality white paper which prevents ink bleeding through with large clear black text.

The RNIB also have a **Big Print Address Book £11**, which is made with a bright orange cover. It allows you to add two addresses per page.



Liquid level indicator (LLI) RNIB £16.00 ex VAT

The RNIB have made changes to their popular Liquid Level indicator, replacing the type of battery needed and the way it is changed to improve safety and make battery changing easier. With a flip up cover it now uses a single AAA battery.

By hanging the LLI unit on the side of your mug with the three metal probes on the inside you can carefully pour your hot or cold liquid. You will know when to stop pouring when it emits a set of intermittent beeps and vibrations.

Making a cup of tea for example the longest probes alert you when to stop pouring hot water if you also want to add milk; the second alert tells you when the cup is nearly full and to stop pouring anything further into the cup. This still gives you a good cm below the rim of the cup which means that you can move it without spilling.



Old and new LLI in comparison

Accord USB Speaker RNIB £52.99 ex VAT

The RNIBs new and improved Accord player is back in stock. The new device is a combination of a Bluetooth speaker and a USB speaker. The player has been designed to be more accessible, with high contrast and tactile buttons as well as easy to locate ports.

The Accord is small, a similar size to a can of beans, and portable. The device can play any audio from other devices, like your phone or tablet, by using the Bluetooth connection.

The device is rechargeable and lasts for five to six hours on a full charge. The device is charged using the supplied USB C cable. However, this does not come with a plug, you may already have a compatible plug.

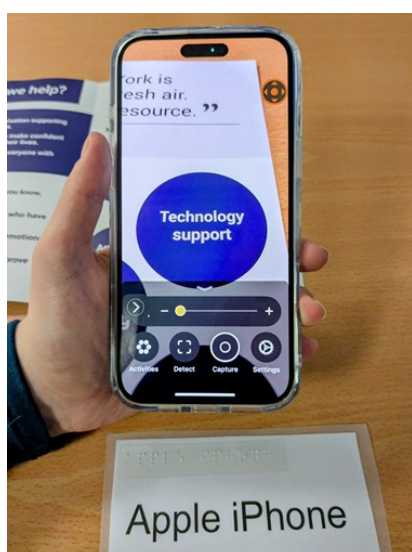
Digital and Tech Support

Technology is a fast-changing landscape that can be difficult to navigate. Thanks to funding from the Two Ridings Community Foundation Q Futures Fund, UKSPF Digital Inclusion Fund and the Feoffees of St Michael Spurriergate, we have been able to update some of the technology available in our Equipment and Information Centre. We are now able to demonstrate and explore the following pieces of equipment with members:

Apple iPhone

Explore how the iPhone looks and feels and see its wide variety of accessibility features. Explore changes that can be made to your phone by first exploring them on our device. Or simply compare smartphones.



Apple iPad

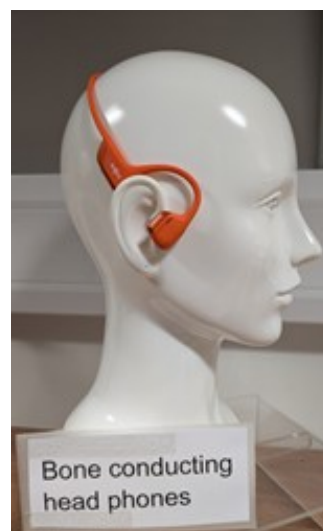
Explore the iPad and its uses. Experience accessibility options and much more.

Meta Ray Ban Gen 1 glasses

These are AI smart glasses that can help provide voice assistance, audio directions, and a hands-free option. They can describe what's in front of you, read out messages, and help you stay connected and independent.

Shockz Open Run bone conducting headphones

These headphones provide excellent sound quality whilst allowing you to be able to hear your surroundings.



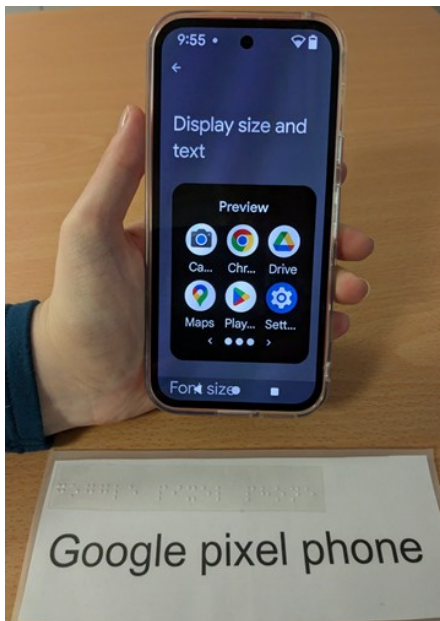
Samsung phone

Explore the Samsung's accessibility features and experience a device with Synaptic's software installed.

Samsung Tablet

Explore a Samsung tablet, discover what it can be used for and experience changes that can be made to make the device more accessible for you.

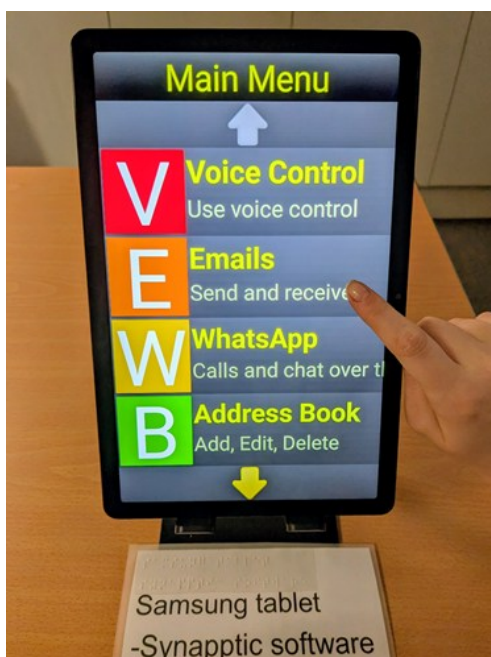
Google Pixel phone



Explore a Google Pixel phone. Experience the accessibility functions, explore Google's Gemini AI assistant and have a go with android's features.

Synapptic tablet and phone

Synapptic is a piece of software that will make mobile phones and tablets simple to use when you have sight loss. By making the interface simpler and speaking



aloud your actions it can make devices more accessible.

Orcam Read 3 with AI function

The Orcam Read 3 is a handheld device that can easily read any printed or digital document aloud. With the Orcam's smart AI assistant you can ask for the text to be summarized or ask questions about the text.

Dolphin Guide Connect

Dolphin Guide Connect is software that helps people with visual impairments stay independent longer by making your computer accessible. It gives you the ability to navigate menus by listening to a voice, dictate text and customize the size of icons on the screen in a simple and accessible way.

We can also demonstrate assistive software for your computer that magnifies and screen reads, such as Fusion Zoomtext, Jaws and Dolphin Supernova.

To visit the Equipment and Information centre to explore any of this technology please call 01904 636 269 to make an appointment. These bespoke appointments will go at your pace and cover what you would like help to achieve.

Thanks to our funders, some of our staff and volunteers have participated in training to become Digital Champions. Our aim is to help our members remain independent and confident in the digital world.

We are also running Digital Cafés each month, covering a variety of topics and providing information on a number of pieces of technology and apps available to help you in daily life. The following is the schedule of Digital Café's until March:

- ♦ 4th December – Talking books on your mobile devices. Information on how to access your talking books on mobile devices in various ways.
- ♦ 8th January – Quick wins, basic android phone accessibility settings. Information on what settings can be changed on your android smartphones to make your device accessible for you.
- ♦ 5th February – Demonstration of Synapptics products, including the Synapptic phone and tablet, watch and USB

talking book player.

- ♦ 5th March – Optelec open day. Ian Thwaites from Optelec will be in the MySight York office to show some of Optelec's assistive tech, including the new Orcam Read 3.

Regular Activities

Here is a reminder of the variety of groups and activities we offer. Whether you prefer meeting in person or by phone, we have something for everyone.

Support with MySight - If you're new to sight loss, or simply need a supportive space, this group is for you. Meets every other month on the first Monday afternoon. In person only.

Esme's Friends – Our support group for anyone who experiences visual hallucinations as a result of sight loss (also known as Charles Bonnet Syndrome). Monthly.

Hybrid Discussion Group or Telephone Discussion - Topics often include a thread connecting back to lived experience with sight loss. On the second Wednesday morning, of every other month, alternating with each other. Upon occasion, guest speakers are invited.

Accessible Board Games - Accessible dominos, cards, scrabble and much more. Monday, weekly.

Knit and Natter - A friendly group for those who love to knit (and natter). Twice a month.

Audio Book Group - The group discusses a different book each

session. Monthly.

Telephone Quiz - An enjoyable way to spend time with friends, old and new. Last Friday of the month.

Chair Exercise - run by Xercise Haxby at MySight York premises. Weekly.

Chair Tai Chi - run by UK Tai Chi via Zoom, at MySight York premises. Weekly. (This group is currently full, please contact Louise to be added to the waiting list).

VI Tennis - run by a York Disability Tennis Network qualified coach, held at the University of York, York Sports Centre. Supported by MySight York volunteers. Weekly.

VI Golf – Hosted at York Golf Club, players follow the same rules as all golfers, with a few minor adjustments. Booking is essential. Monthly.

Cuppa and a Chorus – Hosted at The National Centre for Early Music. Booking is essential. Monthly.

Community Connect Update

Try the Train with Trans Pennine Express.

A consultation with TransPennine Express and MySight York Community Connect consultants

The day gave participants the opportunity to take a journey with TransPennine Express (TPE), covering everything from booking assistance to boarding the train and navigating the station with support.

First time and long-absent returning passengers to York station trialled the booking of assistance 20 minutes in advance of travel and were encouraged to use the 'National Rail Assistance' line for advanced bookings, who can be contacted on **0800 0223 720**.

We then alighted at the WhistleStop Cafe in Malton Train Station to answer consultation questions for TransPennine Express, who were able to take away positive comments and considerations for improvements to the service and refer on to appropriate providers.

One of the MySight York passengers said:
'It gives us confidence. You point us in the right direction. It's not MySight York doing it for you, it's the organisation giving us confidence". In this instance, giving us the confidence to ask at the train station information desk. I'd ask any of the staff now, where I wouldn't have done before. I now realise that people don't necessarily know your needs and that sometimes, you need to state what they are".

Danielle Colcombe, Accessibility and Transport Integration Manager, TransPennine Express said:
"It was great to see so many people building confidence and discovering just how accessible rail travel can be when we work together"
